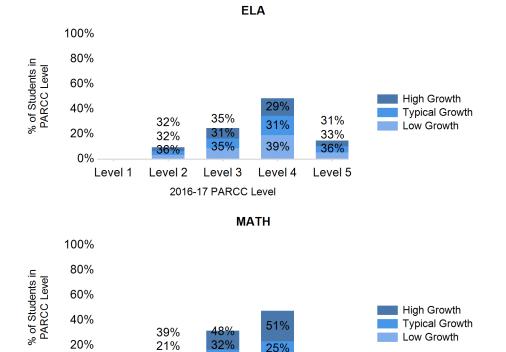

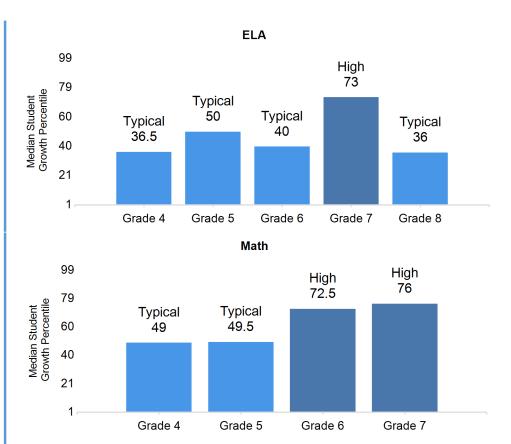

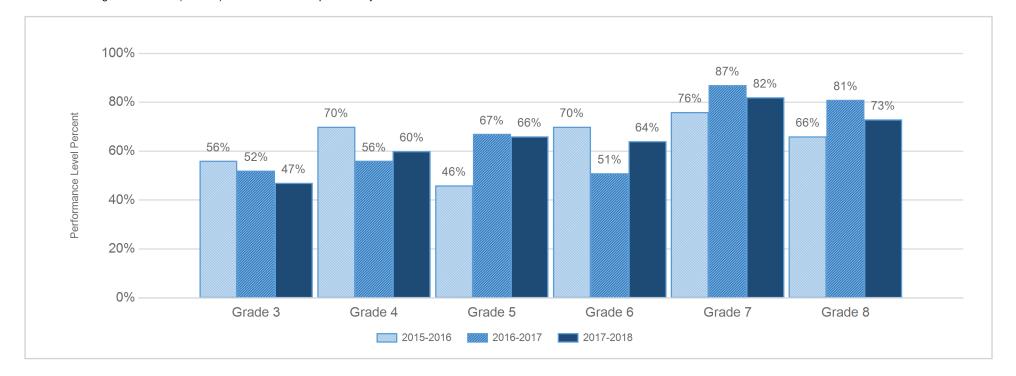

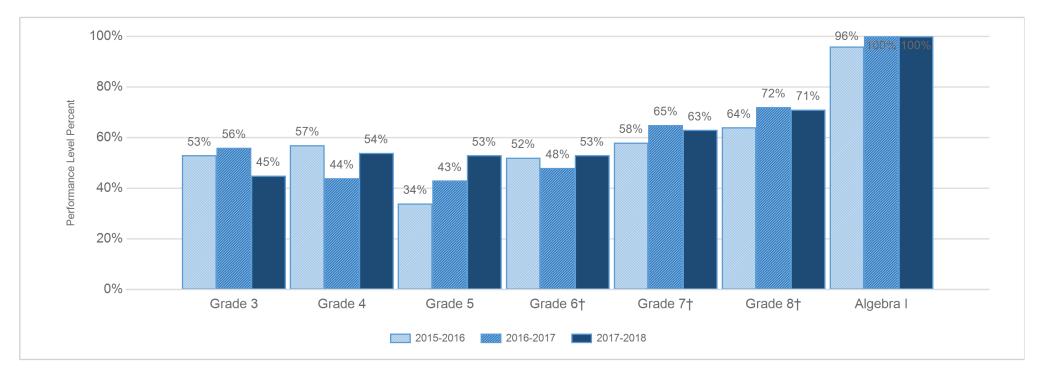

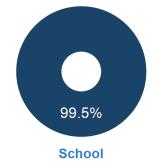
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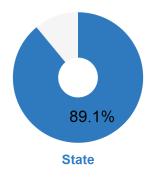

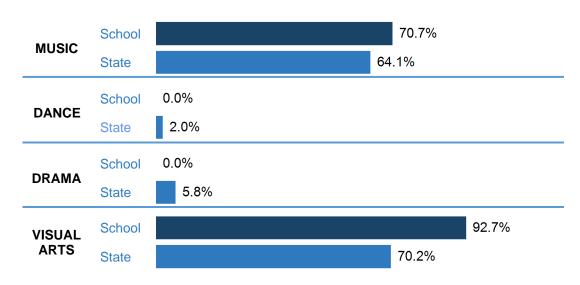


Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes

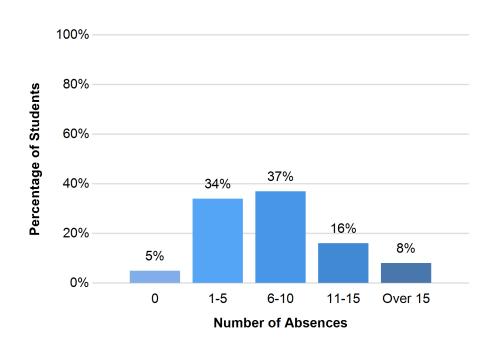

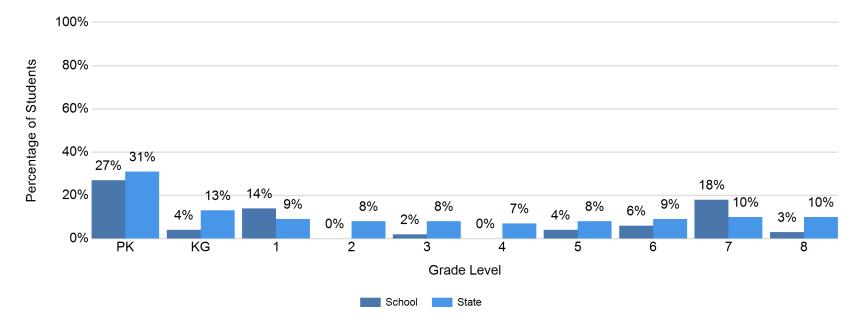
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

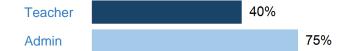
